

AdventFest on Dec. 3 – The Holy Land in Harkins Hall at Grace!

If years of hearing Bible stories at church and Sunday School have piqued your curiosity about The Holy Lands, come to our fellowship hall on **Sunday, December 3** (the first Sunday of Advent) for our annual AdventFest event at **11:40 a.m.** (following morning worship) and "angels" from Grace will bring The Holy Lands to you!



Starting at **11:40 a.m.** you can enjoy a Middle-eastern themed potluck lunch in Harkins Hall (beneath the sanctuary) while listening to sacred carols and selections from Tchaikowsky's, The Nutcracker, played by the Fair Winds Trio (Laurel Sanders, flute; Jenny Koberna, clarinet; and Rich Manning, bassoon). Explore display tables with items from The Holy Lands (conctact Faith Formation or Laurel if you have something to display); put your name into a drawing to win fun and useful prizes; learn to pray The Lord's Prayer in Arabic from a native; listen as our children and youth choirs usher in the season with seasonal music; and join in the singing. The event will end between **1:15 and 1:30 p.m.**

Want to help make the event special? We are looking for two kinds of "angels" – those who can add to the lunch provided by our Super Wednesday and Faith Formation team (Mediterranean Beef Stew and baklava will be provided; we would welcome donations of child-friendly foods, hummus, pita bread or other Middle-Eastern breads, salads, or alternative desserts) and any special or unusual "angel" ornaments or decorations we can add to our angel-themed display table. These divine messengers announced to Mary that she would bear God's son, Jesus; told Joseph to take Mary as his wife and, later, to leave Bethlehem and flee to Egypt; and announced the news of Jesus's birth to the shepherds...all in The Holy Lands!



Love Bade Me Welcome

One of my favorite poets is George Herbert, who was a pastor in the Church of England and lived from 1593-1633.



He was not well-known during his life; his fame only grew when his marvelous collection of poems was discovered and published after his death. Since then, his words have inspired people from all walks of life and especially renowned poets who came long after him, like Samuel Taylor Coleridge, Ralph Waldo Emerson, Emily Dickinson, Gerard Manley Hopkins, T. S. Eliot, and W. H. Auden.

One of my favorite poems by Herbert is entitled Love (III) and is an imagined conversation between

the poet and Christ. As the poet approaches the Lord's table, he recognizes his unworthiness. But Love – personified by Christ himself – insists on feeding and nourishing the poet. Here are the opening lines:

Love bade me welcome. Yet my soul drew back Guilty of dust and sin. But quick-eyed Love, observing me grow slack From my first entrance in, Drew nearer to me, sweetly questioning, If I lacked any thing.

I encourage you to remember that timeless phrase: "Love bade me welcome." Let it be for you an ongoing reminder of Christ's invitation to you to come to church, worship, be forgiven, and be fed by his body and blood. Do not fret over what you lack. Come to Christ and be transformed.

There are a lot of things to share with you this month, so with Christ's loving invitation ringing in our ears and hearts, let's get right to it.

Farewell to the 6 p.m. Worship Service

At its October meeting, Grace's Council accepted my recommendation to end our 6 p.m. worship service. The last service will be held on **November 12** and will include a "sending and farewell" for the two members of our Psalm 151 praise band. This service began about 20 years ago, after a long period of strife between Grace and Lutheran Campus Ministry. It was conceived by Ruth Jenson and Janis Sloka as an opportunity to make peace by doing something positive on a cooperative basis. The service started off in Harkins Hall and only later moved the service into the sanctuary

There were times over the last two decades when this service was very popular, with as many as 60 people in attendance. Over the last few years, however, attendance at this service has steadily declined. In the last few months as few as three people have shown up. The average (not counting worship leaders and musicians) is around eight. Everything in life as well as in the church has a season, and we have concluded that the season for this service has passed. There are a few specific factors that were especially important in making this decision:

1. The 6 p.m. service was intended to appeal to college students, but the vast majority of them now attend the morning liturgies at Grace. That is the style of worship they are used to hearing in their home congregations, and provides them with a welcome feeling of familiarity and the fellowship of a multigenerational group of worshipers.

2. The 6 p.m. service was a useful means for non-students who missed the morning liturgies to drop-in at night for church. That practice is very rare now; most instead now opt to watch the livestream broadcast.

3. The leader of our Psalm 151 praise band, Adam Smith, has taken a job at another university and there is little chance we will be able to find a replacement at his level of musical ability, leadership, and flexibility.

Pastor Hetrick and I are reaching out to the non-students who often



attend this service so that they are aware of the full range of worship options available at Grace. Deacon Alicia Anderson is doing the same with the student community. As you know, she is also a regular guest in worship at our 9 and 10:30 morning services and will continue to have significant interaction with students at those two services.

As I have been saying throughout the pandemic and in its immediate aftermath, this era of Grace's ministry is an opportunity to honestly assess which of our ministries continue to be vibrant and which have reached their natural end. The life of Christian discipleship is a cycle of births and deaths. As the cross reminds us, death leads to new life, and that is certainly the case with the end of our 6 p.m. service. We will be investing some of the money we allocated to the 6 p.m. worship service to enhance our music ministry for children and youth. We will also be able to provide some funding for the inspiring Ecumenical Concert event that Laurel Sanders has traditionally offered at Grace during Holy Week; it makes its post-COVID return next Spring.

I know some will be disappointed by the discontinuation of this service, but it is the right thing to do given how different the world is from what it was just 20 years ago. Rest assured that we plan no changes to our Sunday morning worship services. If you have any questions about the 6 p.m. service and its retirement, please contact me.

Liturgical Returns

Soon you will see some traditional pre-COVID features of our liturgy and worship practices make their return. In summary:

• Beginning in November, our ushers will again come forward with the offering (prior to the communion liturgy). It is richly symbolic of the congregation's offering of time, talent, and treasures which God calls us to make. It also serves as a practical reminder – especially to visitors – that contributions are needed to fund our ministry. Plates will continue to be available in the Narthex for those who want to make their offering after worship.

• Beginning on Reformation Sunday (October 29), whenever we have a choir in worship (typically at 10:30 a.m. but sometimes also at 9 a.m.), we will resume processing with the choir at the beginning and end of worship. This practice is also powerfully symbolic because it teaches us to always follow the cross. One of the acolytes will usually carry the cross. We will be inviting a range of people of different ages to carry God's Word. The title for that person is the "Gospeler." That person will be a powerful reminder of the importance of carrying and being accompanied by God's Word throughout life.

Narthex Refurbishment

As you know from prior issues of Grace Notes and our Sunday bulletin, we are in the midst of a

long-overdue update of our Narthex so we can: (1) better welcome our guests; (2) more easily and effectively engage our members; and (3) provide our hospitality volunteers with everything they need to ensure that everyone who visits Grace has a positive experience that will draw them closer to Jesus.

The first phase of the refurbishment was tidying up the food supplies

at the end of the Narthex near the angel windows. Our Helping Hands team installed shelving and will soon be enclosing those shelves in wooden cabinets. In addition, our chief sexton Roy Evert and our Property Team chair John Palmgren have replaced much of the lighting with high-efficiency LED bulbs. I hope you have already noticed that the space is significantly brighter.

The second phase of the refurbishment will soon begin. We will be relocating some rarely-used coat racks to a space near the ramp entrance. We will then relocate the Welcome Center to the alcove that is at the top of the steps which leads to the main entrance. This will enable us to offer better hospitality to the many people who enter that door, which was added as part of the 2011 building addition.

We have much more planned to make this space more welcoming and user-friendly, but I wanted you to be aware of these "second phase" enhancements because they will begin to change things in an even more visible way.

Once our refurbishment is complete and rededicated, we will rename that space in honor of Pastor Steve Lynn's many years of service to Grace and the spirit of hospitality he fostered here and which has exemplified his ministry.

Honoring our Military Veterans

Some months ago Council authorized the installation of a memorial stone near our columbarium that will honor Grace's veterans. The pad the marker will sit upon has been poured, and we believe the stone will be delivered and set very soon. Assuming we do not experience any logistical delays, we plan

From Our Associate Pastor

We begin this month celebrating All Saints Day and by the end we will be entering the season of Advent and the songs of Mary and Elizabeth. This season always seems to me to be a time where our faith journey on earth and the church of the saints are so very close. The Irish call these "thin spaces." As the historian in my family, I've been the collector of pictures and small things that tell the story of those who came before me. Having some tangible thing to hold or look at helps me imagine their lives and to spend time with them. Perhaps you yourself still hold onto the tie tack someone wore, the favorite cast iron skillet, the memento of a trip or something else that draws you close to someone. Creating times of contemplation grounds me in gratitude and awe to have communion with.

and connect myself to, the stories of those who make up the cloud of witnesses we know as the saints.

Last year for All Saints Sunday, my heart was so full when I saw the pictures some of you brought to worship to place at the altar, reminding us of your beloveds in the communion of saints. We will again encourage you to bring a photo of a beloved saint to place at the altar on **November 5th**, All Saints Sunday. You may allow it to stay

there for all of the services or take it with you again as you leave worship. Christ promises us we will be reunited again. Until then, as we endeavor to live lives of faith, we can know that that cloud of witnesses, who also knew joys and struggles, is encouraging us. As I continue to create my clergy renewal grant, one aspect of my time is to travel to see saints from whom I am separated by millennia, but whose lives are an inspiration to me. Although seeing pictures on a computer has helped me plan, I want to be in the thin spaces that art can create that speak to my soul. One of those spaces is Euphrasiana Basilica in Porec, Croatia. There has a been a worship space here since the 4th century, though time, theft, weather and conflict have led to the building over of parts and later rediscovering them. Effective preservation and restoration have enabled accurate representation of the mosaics there. Seeing them now is increasingly important as the Adriatic Sea rises each year and at the highest tides, some mosaics are now below sea level.

In particular, what is drawing me is the images of 12 women who have become saints, rising above the everyday: Agathe, Euphemia, Thecla, Valeria, Perpetua, Susana, Justina, Agnes, Cecilia, Eugenia, Basilissa and Felicitas. Many or all of these

women may be unknown to you. They are depicted on an arch above Mary holding Jesus. Nearby, a pregnant Mary is visiting a very pregnant Elizabeth and they are dressed in worship leadership garments.

Thecla, one of the 12, was a missionary. Her life is depicted in writings at the time called Acts of

> Paul and the Acts of Thecla written in the second century CE. Later more is written in the Life of Thecla in the 5th century. She hears Paul preach and is so absorbed by his message of the gospel, she abandons family and follows him to Antioch. Later he commissions her to spread the gospel, teach and baptize converts in what becomes modern day Iran. This countercultural life puts her at odds with her family and society, so much so that there is de-

bate whether she was just allowed to teach or should be permitted to baptize, a role reserved for male leaders.

An ancient Christian writer, Tertullian, complains that she is a "woman of pertness who has usurped the power to teach, but this will of



course not give birth to the right of baptizing."



The Basilica in Croatia depicts an abundance of women saints, and also depicts Mary and Elizabeth as leaders. Why did Bishop Euphrasius choose these images and why are they retained in spite of centuries of doctrine in the opposite? In part, this is consistent with the depiction of Mary as a leader in the early church in the East. What were the lives of these women like as leaders in the Jesus movement? They were not silent. They lifted their hands to pray in front of crowds, they cast out demons and held authority. We know that in the end they were all martyrs. It is almost ironic that they are fixed on the wall when so much of their lives of ministry was "on the move."

I imagine that spending time in communion with these saints echoes the story that the church across time has always wrestled with-what is essential. We see this in the scriptural tensions of Timothy and Paul and leaders of the church, and our own time. But when we step back to see the big picture, we see the Church of Jesus Christ living and moving and transforming. Bringing this closer to home, the stories of these women remind me that in the early church there was a sense of urgency that the gospel be taken and lived wherever it could be in prayer and preaching and forming disciples. How might we take the gospel where it is needed?

The women of the church were. by their mere existence, transformational. Their history gives me hope that Christ will continue to form and raise up leaders, both in the ways we expect and those we do not. I think of seeing all genders serving at the altar here at Grace and cherish the story of one of our own saying she was the first girl to serve at the altar in her church, all because she asked. I give thanks when we no longer wait for someone to ask, but instead are those who invite and encourage and empower. These three ways of being make us different from much of the world around us. As you give thanks for your beloveds, perhaps you can ponder how inviting, encouraging and empowering were passed on to you, and ask God to help you carry that light into the lives of others until we are all, as the hymn says, "blessed communion, fellowship divine."

Preparing our Hearts and Minds for Worship

Worship WORDS

Each month in "Worship Words" we explore a different word that relates to an aspect of our worship life and unpack its meaning and significance. This month, we will examine a very uncommon word that

points us to an uncommonly wonderful promise: anamnesis.

The word **anamnesis** is Greek and means "remembrance." It is a unique "worship word" in that it does not refer to any tangible item or furniture related to worship. Nor is it the name of a particular piece of liturgy or song that we utilize in worship. Instead, it refers to our reaction to worship. In particular, our response of remembering – our **anamnesis** – is supposed to happen during the communion liturgy when the pastor quotes Jesus, who said "do this for the remembrance of me" with both the bread and the wine.

But what exactly do we remember? This moment in worship is a chance to remember the *past*, as we ponder the love of Jesus that carried him to the cross so that he could defeat sin, death, and the devil for us. We also remember Jesus's promise that in Holy Communion, we would receive his body and blood so that he could be present with us, bless us, forgive us, and fill us. This act of remembering accompanies us in the *present*, as we prepare our hearts and minds to receive Christ in, with, and through the communion elements. Fortified by his body, blood, presence, and promises, we can then face the *future* with confidence and joy.

The **anamnesis** or remembering that we do as part of communion is an action, but it's also a mindset or disposition – an approach to worship and indeed to life itself that puts Christ at the center of all we are and all we do. And so I encourage you to engage in some holy remembering throughout worship but especially during the communion liturgy. In communion Jesus does not come to us merely as a pious sentiment or something in the past but as a real and vibrant presence, here and now. Thanks be to God!

Green Tip for November

With the Christmas season fast approaching, shopping may be something you have started. Please consider the impact to the environment as you make purchasing decisions. Some things to consider:

• Commit to reuse, repair, and recycle in the present rather than discard, despoil, and destroy our future. Do it for the children and grandchildren

you know and love. Maybe you can re-gift rather than purchasing new things. Better yet, consider gifts that are not disposable items. Consider sharing your time and talents to create memories, rather than giving objects.

- Look for both the product you want and for a provider that cares for creation. Some companies donate a percentage of profits to ocean clean up or planting trees, for example. Some start with sustainable materials and ethical practices. Read the "About" on the vendor's website. Support those providers.
- Choose bamboo, where possible. It's sustainable—a resource that is fast growing, self-renewing, water conserving, carbon sequestering, poverty reducing, and more. It's versatile—used in personal care products, clothing, musical instruments, building materials, paper, towels, sheets, recreational equipment, furniture, and more.
- Consider the impact of transporting your purchases. Ask vendors for and choose slow shipping (non-airplane).




The Love of God and a Grandpa

This article appeared in the **Sunday**, *Oct. 22, 2023 edition of the Centre Daily Times.*

In less than two months, I will be graced with a brand new title: Grandpa. My first grandchild, a little girl, is due in early December. So far mother and baby are doing splendidly, and we're all so excited to meet this child whom we already love so deeply.

My wife and I adopted both our children, so our daughter's pregnancy has been a whole new experience for us. We have excitedly followed a pregnancy app that compares the baby's size each week to a fruit or vegetable. It's clear already that this grandpa will be a very soft touch. Already the family joke is that even though she's not yet born, the baby has me wrapped around her little finger. I don't disagree.

Look, I know that not every parent/ child relationship is healthy. I can only speak from my own experience. I vividly remember the first time I held both my daughter and my son. From the moment their skin touched mine, I knew I would love them forever and do anything to keep them safe, even at the risk of my own life. I never realized I had the capacity to love so fully and so unconditionally. Indeed, to be a parent is to love without counting the cost. And believe me, there is a cost beyond money in the form of sleepless nights spent tending, consoling, and worrying. But no matter what happens, somehow we never stop loving our children. Likewise, our imperfect children somehow



manage to keep loving their equally imperfect parents too.

Whenever I wonder about the capacity of a very flawed person like me to love like this, my mind turns to God, who loves us even more perfectly, regardless how many times we disappoint, rebel, or try to run away. How can God love us despite our many failings? It seems to be a universal question, one most eloquently addressed thousands of years ago in Psalm 8 by someone who was contemplating the night sky while talking to God:

"When I look at the sky, which you have made, at the moon and the stars, which you set in their places what are human beings, that you think of them; mere mortals, that you care for them? Yet you made them inferior only to yourself; you crowned them with glory and honor. You appointed them rulers over everything you made; you placed them over all creation: sheep and cattle, and the wild animals too; the birds and the fish and the creatures in the seas. O Lord, our Lord, your greatness is seen in all the world!"

In the end, the eternal and unconditional love God has for us and the love we possess for our children and grandchildren is a holy mystery. But at some level, our ability as humans to love one another depends on our ability to see the humanity and, indeed, the image of God in the eyes of the other. I'm already able to see those sacred attributes in my unborn granddaughter whom I've never met. So why is it often so hard for me – and perhaps you too - to see that humanity and divine image in the people all around us? Is it possible that the political polarization in our nation and the brutal wars around the globe stem at least in part from this failure to see each other as God sees us, as people of inherent worth and dignity?

It's a problem no one article will solve. But what I can do in these few words is to remind you, dear reader, that you have dignity and worth, just because you exist. God loves you. No matter what you think you've done to annoy, alienate, or chase God away, you remain beloved and that will never end. But remember that God feels the same way about everyone else - even the person you believe to be your enemy. Imagine how different our world would be if we could just see others as God sees them. I need to make a lot of progress on this. Maybe you do too. But right now, I must run to the store. Grandpa has more presents to buy for the baby.



The beneficiary, State College Area Meals on Wheels, is a non-profit 501(c)3 that prepares and delivers nutritious, affordable meals to the elderly and disabled living within the State College Area School District to help maintain their quality of life and allow them to remain in their own homes. The State College chapter was founded in 1971 and uses Grace Lutheran's facilities to serve approximately 150 clients five days per week. Since the local organization operates on donations and receives no government tax dollars, its services are extended to people of all ages (currently ages 14 through 98) who have a wide variety of health concerns.

Adam writes:

"As we enter the season of Advent, our lives seem to enter a constant state of hurry in the buildup to Christmas. One of the things I've appreciated the most about serving as a church musician has been the opportunity to slow down and appreciate the waiting. The flexibility of the new system will allow us to do many wonderful things with the vast array of events we hold in that space.

AdventFest: Palestine

Over a year ago we selected Palestine as this year's "virtual location" for AdventFest. We did so because the West Bank of Palestine contains several vibrant Lutheran congregations. I've been blessed to visit a few of them and to meet their pastors. Centering our celebration with the Palestinian Lutherans is not a political statement but, rather, simply a chance to further broaden our understanding of what it means to be a Lutheran Christian.

AdventFest in Palestine will be especially meaningful this year, given all the conflict that is happening there. My heart breaks for innocent Israelis and Palestinians on both sides. I am particularly worried about the Palestinian Lutheran congregations, because they often find themselves in a vise, caught between religious extremists on either side. They are true peacemakers.

At Advent Fest you will see some videos from Pastor Rodny Said,

pastor of The Evangelical Lutheran Church of Hope in Ramallah. They are a Lutheran congregation in Ramallah, north of Jerusalem, in the West Bank. It is a congregation of about 400 people; they are Palestinian Christians and worship in the Arabic language.

Pastor Said recently asked me to write a letter to his congregation to let them know that they are not alone and that we are praying for them. I was very happy to do so. Pastor Said translated it into Arabic, read it to his congregation, and told me that it helped renew their hope. I often feel helpless to make a difference in a conflict as entrenched as the Middle East, and so writing the letter and praying for the people of Hope helped me. I encourage you to pray for them as well.

As I wrote last month, these are important and meaningful events that will fill and replenish your soul and spirit. They are ways that we love our gracious God and love our neighbor. I hope you will prioritize them in the midst of lives that are so busy. May we never allow the merely "good" to crowd out the "essential."

Prayers at the Cross Surely by now you have noticed

that we have a large cross within our main entrance and invite people to leave prayer requests in a basket there. It has proven to be a very meaningful addition to that space, is used by many people who are not members of our congregation, and as a result the basket is overflowing with prayers. To make space for new prayers, we will occasionally empty the basket so that the older prayers can be prayed from our altar on Sunday morning (without betraying any confidences). But rest assured that whether the prayers are in the basket or at our altar. God knows and cares about your needs.

Finally...

One of my role models for both ministry and manhood is Fred Rogers, famous for "Mister Rogers Neighborhood" on PBS. And so I will close today with a simple but meaningful prayer that Mister Rogers prayed each time he entered his television studio: "Dear God, let some word that is heard be Yours." I think that's a lovely prayer, one suitable for just about anyone at any time. Perhaps Mister Rogers' prayer will be one that you will want to add to your prayer toolbox as well. Peace be with you.
