Grace Lutheran 125-Year Milestone Sept. 10, 2023

On Sunday, September 10, 1898 – exactly 125 years ago this September - our congregation, Grace Lutheran Church of State College, was chartered, one of the earliest downtown churches. Several years later a traditional brick country church was built in the 400 block of College Avenue. As the congregation grew, there was a need for more space



and additional parking, which led to the 1963 groundbreaking for construction of our current building near Penn State's main campus. Many new ministries began at Grace in the 1960s: our preschool, Meals on Wheels, The Bells of Grace, activity spaces to encompass growing children and youth programs, and much more.

As Grace Lutheran's ministries continued to expand and diversify, our ministries again needed more space. In 2013, after multiple consultations with the leadership and congregation at Grace, additions were completed following designs by KTH architects, including a major overhaul of our kitchen; several classrooms; a new office for our preschool; the Miller Center youth room, gymnasium, and kitchen; storage space; and additional parking. The additional space enabled us to expand the reach of our own ministries (church and preschool) as well as organizations that use our facilities, such as State College Meals on Wheels.

Today the large "ship" that is Grace Lutheran Church reaches ports not only within our community, but also – with the aid of livestreaming and podcasts – around the world. What comes next? Only God knows, but if in faith we abide, with the Spirit at our side and Christ's love as our guide, we can embrace whatever the future brings. As we look forward to the future, we have what we need (not only God and ample space, but also each other!) to live, love, and serve in the name of Jesus Christ.

On **September 10** we will begin our 8:00 and 9:00 a.m. Sunday worship services with the same hymn that was sung when we opened our doors on Garner Street – *Open Now Thy Gates of Beauty* (ELW 533) – and other parts of the liturgy that bind together congregational worship practices used over our history. (Our picnic worship is at **11 a.m.** in our courtyard, a casual contemporary service led by Psalm 151.) A fuller celebration will follow at a special worship service on Wednesday evening, **November 15 at 6:30 p.m.** (after our Thanksgiving dinner), at which time we will share

Back Home from the Holy Lands Our band of 16 pilgrims returned back home at the end of June after nine transformational days in Israel and Palestine. Things back home were pretty much the same as we left them (except for our overgrown lawns!). We, however, came home different people than when we left. That is the blessing of a pilgrimage as compared to a mere vacation.

Linda and I spent the first few days back home joyfully looking at the many treasures we brought home, like fresh spices, honey from the Golan Heights, olive wood crafts, the colorful tunic I bought for Linda in Jericho, stoles for me to wear at church, and beautiful Byzantine icons. Linda has been busily devouring the Palestinian cookbook our guide Raj gave her, and as a result we have been eating some truly scrumptious meals.

But it's not the "stuff" we bring home that means the most. It is the experiences and the people that leave us most transformed. What a wonderful group of pilgrims we had. We grew close. We became vulnerable to one another, and in our evening devotional time we shared deeply and profoundly.

Several experiences in particular stand out for me:

- Celebrating Holy Communion on the Mount of the Beatitudes;
- Blessing our pilgrims with a watery cross on their foreheads as we waded in the Jordan River where Jesus was baptized (that's where the group photo was taken);
- Being permitted to enter the ancient 6th century desert monastery of Bar Saba;
- Renewing the wedding vows
 of the couples on the trip, at
 the chapel in Cana, where
 Jesus performed the miracle
 of turning water into wine at a
 wedding (sadly, history did not
 repeat this time!);
- As a son of Tabor Lutheran Church, standing for the first time on our namesake, Mount Tabor, where the Transfiguration occurred;
- Savoring one of the best cups of tea I have ever had, served by a Bedouin at the Wadi Qelt; and
- Dancing! Our group danced on a big wooden boat as we sailed

on the Sea of Galilee, and at our farewell dinner across the street from the Shepherds' Field, we were invited by a Palestinian folk dance group to join with them in a few steps. (Needless to say, none of us will be giving up our day jobs.)

Linda likewise had an unforgettable and transformative pilgrimage experience. At the Church of the Nativity her body quivered with the Spirit's presence as she approached the spot where Christ was born and, being surrounded by pilgrims from Africa, felt the breadth of Christ's kingdom and love. She also enjoyed a delicious cup of coffee on the highest mountain in Israel, and floated in the Dead Sea, at the lowest point on earth.

Each night during devotions we contemplated the day's adventures through the prism of the story of Christ's Transfiguration. What was our mountaintop experience? How will we take it "back down the mountain" when we return home? Can we, like the disciples

in that story, look up and "see only Christ"? It takes a lifetime to unpack the experiences of a pilgrimage. But we were granted priceless spiritual food for our journey.

If there was anything at all I might change, it would be the heat. In Galilee, temperatures were in the high 90s, with humidity. Jerusalem is at a higher elevation, so the temperatures were closer to 90 there. And so we are tentatively making plans that the next pilgrimage trip will take place in January 2025. I've been to Israel in January; the temperature averages around 50 degrees, which feels really, really good when compared to January weather in central Pennsylvania. So start planning to join us on the next pilgrimage. People on this trip said things like "this was the trip of a lifetime" and the "best trip I've ever taken." Another pilgrim said that his prayer life has been transformed by this experience. I hope in 2025 you will have your opportunity to experience that sort of transformation too.

Narthex Refurbishment

Over the years we have made many important enhancements to our 1965 building. Most notable among them was the 2011 expansion, but other things like video streaming and sound in the Miller Center have also increased our building's utility because they accommodate the congregation we are now, not merely the congregation we were in 1965.

Ironically, one of the most heavily used areas of our church is the one that has changed the least in those 58 years. That is our narthex. It is long overdue for a refurbishment so that we can (1) better welcome our guests, (2) more easily and effectively engage our members, and (3) provide our hospitality volunteers with everything they need to ensure that everyone who visits Grace has a positive experience that will draw

them closer to Jesus.

The project is still in its natal stage, but in general what we envision are enhancements like (1) updated lighting that brightens and illuminates the space in a safer and more welcoming manner while reducing our energy usage, (2) adding enclosed storage near the Angel Windows so that food stocks (used in our very important feeding ministries) do not clutter up the space, (3) relocating the welcome center to the left of the entrance (added in 2011) that leads to the steps and main entrance so that our ushers are positioned where people are entering and can offer a better welcome and enhanced security, (4) centralizing all member sign ups (sponsorships, lectoring, etc.) in the space currently occupied by the Welcome Center so that no one has to uncomfortably bend over to sign a sheet or cast about looking for information, (5) relocate wall racks so that devotionals and other literature are centralized, easy to find, and do not take up valuable walking and gathering spaces, (6) add some electronic announcement boards to help people better know what is going on at Grace from week-to-week, and (7) generally open up the space so that it feels more welcoming on Sunday morning and on special occasions like funerals. There are more things too, like a splash of paint here-and-there, but I think you get the picture.

The work won't happen overnight and will be implemented in stages. But we think it will provide a true enhancement to our "public face" and be a space that reflects the welcoming environment that we have always strived for Grace to be. To that end, once our refurbishment is complete and rededicated, I have proposed and Council has unanimously agreed that we will rename that space the Pastor Lynn

Welcome Center, in honor of Pastor Steve Lynn's many years of service to Grace and the ethos of hospitality that he fostered here and which has exemplified his ministry.

A Milestone Anniversary: 125 Years of Grace

Did you know that Grace Lutheran Church is celebrating its 125th birthday this year? We will be marking this milestone in a number of ways, including three special worship services:

- Sunday, September 10 is our official birthday, the day we were chartered. That Sunday will include some music that was played at the dedication of our 1965 building (information from 1898 is no longer available) and the Bible lessons will be those that are used for the dedication of a church building. It will be a good time to give thanks to God for the many ministries and transformed lives God has brought about throughout Grace's history.
- On *Wednesday, November 15* we will have a special evening service that focuses on Grace's work in keeping one of the two "great commandments," loving God. That service will be rich with music, including all the organ, bell, and choral pieces Grace recently commissioned.
- On *Wednesday, April 24, 2024* we will gather again for another special worship service, this time centered on the other "great commandment," loving our neighbor. This service will highlight the many ways we care for our neighbors around the block and around the world, and will encourage us to continue that long legacy of service for which Grace is rightly known.

We look forward to celebrating with you!

"Grace for Every Body" – God's Social Healing

Recently I read an article by a young woman named Roxanne Smith whose life changed dramatically at age 27. Without warning, severe spinal pain exploded into her existence. She wrote that this pain insisted on ruling over her and dictating her life. There was "life before" and "life after," defined by the pain that meant she suddenly needed to lie down for 22 hours a day. Did I mention she had just gotten married? She went from being able-bodied, athletic, and active to being "sidelined, shut out, and so, so sad." While our journeys are probably different, there may be times when physically, or emotionally, or spiritually, we find ourselves thinking about "life before" and "life after" some change, be it temporary or "the new normal."

I value Roxanne's article because she talked about a kind of healing beyond the three we may be used to hearing about: physical, spiritual and emotional. She wrote about "social healing," as the fourth kind of healing. This social healing happens when a person with struggles is accepted and supported by their community. It was a healing she found within her faith community as they created a space for her to be present at worship but lie down. They also provided an opportunity to serve as a Stephen Minister by phone.

"Social healing" may come in helping a person with allergies to things like nuts or gluten or chemical sensitivity. This last one is a part of my life. It may be adjusting for those who cannot stand for more than a few minutes because of pain. It may mean making space for those who live with emotional challenges. or cognitive challenges, like autism, post-concussion syndrome or sensory sensitivities to things like flashing lights or loud noise. Some may struggle to be understood or embraced. The common factor is the fear or reality of being sidelined, shut out or as Roxanne wrote, "just so sad." When we can overcome their fears or even our own wonderings, these spaces reveal that they are the same ones Jesus shows up to heal in the gospels. Beyond the physical, emotional or spiritual healing in all of Jesus' ministry is this fourth and common healing that is God's desire — social healing. Social healing is a repairing of the breaches that struggles cause — no more sidelines, or moments some one is shut out with a phrase like, "well, at least..."



There are ways we offer this social healing at Grace so that people who are experiencing struggles can be accepted, supported and embraced as they are. When people are hospitalized, we try to visit. Our card ministry mails cards; and eucharistic visitors bring communion. Our grief support folks offer resources and presence. Anyone struggling with any of life's challenges, can

request a Stephen Minister to accompany them in compassionate support.

Our livestream and radio broadcasts bring worship to those who are away from the building at the corner of Beaver and Garner, but connected in Spirit. We want everyone to know they are an important part of our community all the time. And we are still growing in understanding.

This social healing also happens when our faith community is active in giving people with limitations or struggles the chance to serve in community and to lead in community as they are. I am speaking about the grace we have with ourselves and others when we find we have to move more slowly. I am speaking to our ongoing work to create spaces that offer greater comfort and ease. Just like the other types of healing, social healing is a gift from God. It's God's way of bringing out compassion in our community. God can use weakness to arouse compassion in the strong.

The Psalmist tells us that "those who go out weeping, carrying seed to sow, will return with songs of joy," carrying a harvest with them. Social healing includes God's

turning of sadness to joy in being gathered, fed, and sent together. My greatest hope is that no one feels there is not love or grace for them and their body. This is different from speaking acceptance but still seeing ourselves as distinct.

Our Disciples Together group is made up of Grace members and folks beyond who are drawn to our activities. They delight in activities specific to them, but also want to be seen as leaders and as hosts. Our gathering at Orchard Park was for anyone in the Grace community and beyond. It gave such joy to all for people who are not members of Disciples Together to embrace the "together" part of our group name and join us as we led everyone in cardio drumming.

While our various groups at Grace have times for specialized gathering, there is also profound joy when we gather broadly, like the sower who scatters the seed with abandon in hopes there will be astounding growth. I hope you will come out for "Grace on the Go" at Good Day Café on Thursday, August 3rd, from 5:30-7:00 p.m. Disciples Together is hosting the space staffed by the Café. Some of our Disciples may be working or greeting. Sand-



wiches, treats and beverages will be available for purchase. This is a perfect chance to hang out, grab a treat or meal, and support the opportunity for the Café to touch lives. It is a great chance to invite a friend, maybe someone who is longing for greater connections.

In some ways, the seasons we have been navigating have allowed God to test our love for each other. I think that as the church, as followers of Jesus, now more than ever, we have a gift to offer in this world: To love people as they are and to embrace their presence fully. Much of the world we live in does not offer this space or grace for every body.

I thank God for all the ways we are already living into this joy and pray for our continued flexibility as we embody grace with one another. Imagine a world where the world beyond Grace Lutheran Church experiences that God's social healing is indeed a gift.

Finally...

A constant theme for me in these articles is prayer, because I think it's something we talk a lot about doing but actually do on a much less frequent and effective basis. I want to equip you to pray more regularly because I think it is the very foundation of our relationship with God. This month I want to include a few quotes from theologian L. Joseph Letendre from his book When You Pray that I found really helpful for me. I think they will help you as well.

- Consistently going to the gym and lifting weights will make you stronger - whether you enjoy your workouts or not. Prayer is like that. To pray well and reap its graces, we must pray faithfully. This requires persistence and perseverance.
- Tell yourself, "I can pray anytime," and you end up never

praying. If we are commanded to pray at all times, we must at least pray sometime. There must be points in our day when we interrupt all other activity to pray.

• Prayer, like any exercise, requires consistency if it is to bear fruit.

As is my custom, I want to end by offering you a prayer that you can pray. Prayer doesn't have to be mysterious or hard. We just have to do it, and sometimes having the words before you can make it a little easier. This month I bring you a prayer for caregivers, because (as the husband of a nursing assistant) I am mindful that although summer is a time of rest and recreation for many, others have to keep working and toiling regardless of the season. In particular, if you are caring for someone who is physically, mentally, or emotionally struggling, chances are that summer will not

provide you the fullness of rest that you need.

And so let us pray for all the tired, burdened, yet unrelentingly loving and dedicated caregivers in our midst:

God, our refuge and strength, we thank you for the compassion you infuse in your people, especially those who care for the physical and emotional needs of friends, family, and strangers. Strengthen all caregivers in body and spirit. Refresh them when weary; console them when anxious; comfort them in grief; and hearten them in discouragement. Giver of peace, enlarge our patience and enable us to embrace all who live with difficulties we may one day share; in Jesus's name. Amen. (source: All Creation Sings, p. 54)

Worship WORDS

Each month in "Worship Words," we explore a different word that relates to an aspect of our worship life, and we unpack its meaning and significance. This month, we will examine the word *sacristy*, generally discuss the function of that special room, and share what happens in Grace's sacristy.

At its most fundamental level, a sacristy is a place set-aside near the church sanctuary for the sacraments (like Holy Communion) to be pre-

pared and for the worship leaders to dress in their special worship vestments. Sacristies have been part of church buildings for many, many centuries because of their important practical function.

Grace's sacristy is a small, narrow room immediately behind the organ, with doors at both ends. On Sunday morning, this is where communion is prepared. Wafers and communion ware are stored there, and there are two closets: one for accolyte robes and one for the pastors' chasubles (a special vestment worn when presiding at communion). Other things stored in the sacristy are items used in baptisms, oil for the candles, and wicks for the acolyte torches. Grace's sacristy also contains a small refrigerator for keeping communion elements fresh, a dishwasher for cleaning the communion glasses, and a sink for general cleanup.

You may notice that during the offertory the pastor presiding at communion typically goes to the sacristy to select a chasuble. It is also a time to wash hands (in preparation for handling the communion elements) and to quietly pray in anticipation at being part of the astonishing mystery of simple wheat and wine becoming the body and blood of Jesus Christ.

Council Highlights

At its **June 2023** meeting, Grace's Church Council converted three ministry teams into ministry coordinator positions in recognition that those teams are fostering congregation-wide ministries which benefit from the heightened degree of cooperation and collaboration fostered by presence at the coordinators' monthly meeting. Those new coordinator positions (and their coordinator, in parentheses) are Anti-Hunger (Kathy Kalbach), Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging Team (Natalie Slane), and Tech (Alyson Hoegg).

At its July 2023 meeting, Grace's Church Council:

- Elected Anne Rohrbach (President), Ryan Knowles (Vice President), and Vicki Sue Golemboski (Secretary). Lester Cutter was reappointed as Treasurer and Finance Team Chair.
- Allocated an amount up to \$10,000 from Grace's \$19,000 2022-23 budget surplus to refurbish the Narthex to better welcome our guests and engage our members; when the refurbishment is finished and the space rededicated, it will be renamed in honor of Pastor Steve Lynn in honor of his many years of ministry at Grace and dedication to hospitality.
- Allocated an amount up to \$4,000 from Grace's \$19,000 2022-23 budget surplus to refurbish the nursery to be a low-stimulation space for guests and members with sensory challenges.
- Allocated an amount up to \$2,000 from Grace's \$19,000 2022-23 budget surplus to develop a smartphone/ tablet app that will make it easier for Grace members to get up-to-date information on church events, submit prayer requests, worship remotely, and more deeply engage in the life of the congregation.
- Approved the expenditure of up to \$20,000, from the Lu Magnusson memorial fund, for the upgrade of the Harkins Hall audio system, which is nearly 60 years old and unable to accommodate events like Advent Fest.

Additionally, 741 people received furniture and appliances they otherwise would have done without, and 95 low-income, financially vulnerable Representative Payee Clients were helped to assure their essential bills were paid and their basic needs were met within their budget. In preparation for the next fiscal year and the winter ahead, IHS used a small overage in the budget to prepay oil for the Centre County Fuel Bank Program.

Anti-Hunger Update

We have had several changes with our Anti-Hunger program at Grace in the last few months. There have been ups and downs. For a while, we (the Centre County YMCA Anti-Hunger program) were not able to get food to use for distribution due to funding restrictions and reduced donations from stores. They needed to cancel a few of the distribution sites. Luckily Grace Lutheran was still able to hold our distributions throughout this time (just with less food to hand out). Through prayers and generosity, in July they were able to gather some more food to distribute.


We continue to travel to Philipsburg twice a month to help pack and plastic wrap the pallets for several of the distributions throughout the area. Our role has changed slightly in Philipsburg, but we are still able to help with the food insecurity in Centre County.

Due to the need in the State College Area, we are continuing to hold two Food Distributions at Grace Lutheran Church the 2nd and 4th Thursdays of each month. We unload the food truck around **1:45 p.m.** and then prebag some of the food in the Narthex. We usually start to distribute the food (outside) between **3:30 and 3:45 p.m. until 6:00 p.m.** We typically provide food for 110 families at every distribution. We can always use volunteers, so if you are able to help part of the time (or the entire time) on Thursdays, please contact Kathy Kalbach at kathymkalbach@gmail.com.

For several months we have been storing empty boxes and extra food in the far end of the Narthex and moving the Easy-up tents from the Youth Room and tables from Harkin's Hall to the Distribution area in the semi-circle in the front of the Church for each Distribution. In the next several weeks we are hoping to install some cabinetry (where there are currently coat racks) to more efficiently store items needed for each distribution.

We can always use volunteers! Volunteering is not a long term commitment. You can choose to help as little or as much as you would like or as your schedule permits. Green Tip for August

We rely on farmers for our food, and it is important to recognize the struggles and challenges they face, especially in a changing climate. This is the third of three Green Tips focused on the challenges of farmers and what we can do to support them.

#3 Extreme weather

Extreme weather events are likely to become more frequent in a changing climate.

Crops need moderate soil moisture, nutrient levels, and water availability. Excess or lack of water and nutrients negatively impact crops. Standing water from too much rain can create a condition called hypoxia, where enough oxygen cannot get into the soil, subsequently killing the crops in a couple days. Droughts create conditions where there is not enough soil moisture for important nutrient cycling to occur (plants need water to uptake nutrients). Severe storms can damage crops and erode soil along with nutrients that were previously applied. Pests and fungi that damage crops can increase in areas with warmer temperatures, wetter conditions, and higher amounts of CO₂ in the air. Extreme weather is difficult for livestock production too. In addition to lower crop yield from drought, storm damage, pests, and increases in heat stress can result in increases in disease and can reduce fertility and milk production.

A quote in State Impact PA from a Pennsylvania farmer and executive director of PASA, Hannah Smith-Brubaker, expresses this frustration felt by farmers.

"On my own farm, boy, we just can't follow the rhythms and planting and harvesting schedules that we used to be able to for decades," she said. "We're finding that the spring weather is so variable, the fall weather is so variable, and the summer weather has so many longer, short term droughts. But then we'll just get a deluge of rain."

Dealing with these challenges and adapting to these changes can be expensive for farmers. Some farmers need to put in temporary structures, such as high-tunnels to protect their crops and to try to lessen the temperature extremes.

What can we do to help farmers? Support local farmers through farmer's markets and Community Supported Agriculture opportunities. Some farmer's markets are now online (centremarkets.com and statecollegemarket.com).



The Food Bank of the State College Area, Inc., is always in need of donations. 
ECHO Sunday School


